

Discussion Director Week 3: Consider the questions that have been given to you while you read. Then, record your answers before your discussion. Additionally, you should consider your own thoughts, feelings, and concerns as you read to help you craft 3 questions of your own. You need to write down your questions and record your responses to your own questions before you discussion, and then record your group members' responses during your discussion. Make sure you questions are open-ended and focus on the big ideas of the book or the way it was written. Your questions should force your group members to really think about and analyze the text.

Pose the question, allow your group members to share their thoughts in a typical discussion pattern. Listen, give feedback, share your thoughts, and ask any additional follow-up questions if they should come to mind. Then take a few moments to record your group members' thoughts on your paper
