When characters speak...

1. Enclose dialogue in quotation marks.

Ex. "The what?" said Harry.

2. Don't use quotation marks when you write only the general meaning of what a character has said, not the exact words.

Ex. Professor Trelawney told Harry he had the Grim.

3. If introducing a quote, use a comma before the dialogue.

Ex. She stopped again, and then said, in a very matter-of-fact tone, "You look in excellent health to me, Potter."

4. If dialogue comes before the quote, use a comma, question mark, or exclamation point at the end of a quote- never a period.

Ex. " I don't think it looks like a Grim," she said flatly.

Ex. "The what?" said Harry.

Ex. "The Grim, my dear, the Grim!" cried Professor Trelawney.

When showing personal thought...

1. *Italicize* what the character is thinking.

Indirect: She wondered who he was.

Direct speech: "Who is he?" she asked.

Direct thought: *Who is he?*
